


ANNUAL REPORT

Media engagements: We organized and led 8 TikTok live sessions on different adolescents and youth issues, we attended 6 media shows (<u>KU TV</u>, Koch FM, Ruben FM, Pamoja Radio, and pearl Radio) holding discussions on Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights, Climate Change, Mental Health, Food Security, poverty and other social justice issues that impact the youth.

Key media highlights

- 1. Community Voices Network at KU TV: Across borders, youth-led movements unite against unreliable health systems and inadequate youth-friendly services, creating a global front for change. In the face of this revolution present an opportunity for advancing the agenda for meaningful youth engagement in the space of adolescent and youth sexual reproductive health. At Ku TV, our from Sauti Zetu Hub, Mercy Mugecha and Mary Maina share their vision on meaningful youth engagement in Sexual Reproductive Health programming in line with the Gen Z revolution.
- 2. Community Voices Network Executive Director shares an article titled the power of naming and story telling in the fight against sexual and gender based violence: In 1991, at St. Kizito Secondary school, a school located in Meru town, 306 boys attacked a girls' dormitory leading to death of 19 girls, 71 girls were raped and over 81 were injured. On witnessing the outcomes of these attacks, the then President, Moi shed tears. Today, the school has changed its name to St Cyprian Boys High School, perpetrators were all released and the survivors who some are parents of girls continue to pay for the price of these injustice, they suffer from trauma and stigma. These unfortunate incident can be the driving fuel for anti-gender based violence activism unfortunately not many activist leave alone Kenyans know about the incident.

Key Milestones

1. For youth-led grassroots organizations like us, financial challenges that limit our growth are common, acquiring a running office space and a youth resource center in 2024 has not only helped us with a space to work reducing cost on venues but also increased our credibility positioning us for meaningful partnerships and potential funding.



2. For actions to combat climate change to be owned and driven by grassroots, we must ensure that Climate change adaptation and mitigation efforts are viewed from the lens of communities.

People from Nairobi's informal settlement to develop Community Climate Change and Health
